



ICMR Congress 1997 - Upice-Czech .R

1997 was election year for officers and Technical committee of ICMR. The following officers were elected for a period of 4 years:

President; Danny Hughes(England). Secretary; Bruno Gozzelino (Italy). Treasurer, Wendelin Parpan (Switzerland).

The following were elected to the Technical committee for a period of two years: Raimondo Ballico (Italy), Wolfgang Munzel (Germany), Johannes Mayer (Austria), Douglas Barry (Ireland), Alistair Lorimer (Scotland), and Tomo Sarf (Slovinia).

After two excellent bids, from Malaysia and New Zealand, to stage the 1999 World Trophy, the congress voted in favour of Malaysia, where the event will take place in the province of Sabah, in Mt. Kinabalu park, Northern Borneo. The Sabah Tourism Promotion Company will work with Balwant Singh Kler of the Malaysian Athletic Federation as the local organisers.

The 1999 European trophy will take place in Bad Kleinkirchheim (Austria) on July 4th.

News Items.

Gudrun Pfluger

It is reported that Gudrun has recovered well from injury which effected her form in 1997. She showed good form in a road race in Vienna at the end of last season. Now she is involved in long distance cross country ski races. She intends to compete in the premiere 1998 mountain running events in Sestriere and Reunion.

Skyrunning

The Federation for Sport at Altitude (FSA) are staging a high altitude event termed The Skyrunning

World Championship's on July 12th. It will start from Cervinia (Italy) and cover 42km, much of it at altitudes over 4000m. The medical results of the investigations being carried out by FSA are of great interest to ICMR whose races are limited to lower altitudes of about 3000m on the advice of the IOC medical publications.

Veterans World Championships

The ICMR management committee have considered a request from Austria to organise a veterans mountain running championships. It is recognised that there is a high percentage of mountain runners in the veteran category and there is no doubt that such an event, properly conceived and organised, would create much interest. However, the manpower and financial resources of ICMR are such that it would constitute a major distraction from the work it currently has in hand. Therefor the idea has been passed on to the World Association of Veterans Athletes (WAVA) for their consideration, with the offer of technical assistance should they decide to go ahead.

European Rule Change

Mountain running had a significant success in the councils of the EAA when an addition to their rules was approved at the 1997 congress in Budapest. Rule 11 now includes recognition of the European mountain running trophy. The

next step is to gain approval to convert this to Championship status.

Associate member Races

Just 2 races have registered this year so far, the 'Smarna Gora' international in Slovinia and the Mt. Kinabalu international in Sabah(Malaysia). Organisers of international mountain races please note that you can register for 1998 by completing the form to be found on the back pages of this newsletter. It is the policy of ICMR to try to forge close relations with race organisers as well as National Athletic Federations.

IAAF Travel Grant 1998

The details of this grant and its distribution have not yet been decided by IAAF. We always hope for a generous allowance. Those countries who have been in receipt of travel support should be aware that the IAAF is considering a change to the way in which the money is distributed. The new arrangement is likely to insist on receiving countries being able to demonstrate that they have well establishes championship organised under the auspices of their athletic federation, and that they can send athletes who are of a certain minimum standard. ICMR will want to emphasise the importance of having as many countries compete in the World trophy as possible and that due allowance will have to be made for those countries in which the sport is new and just developing. We must also try to ensure that there is an element of 'need' introduced into the arrangements.

Australia

The second issue of their Mountain running newsletter has been published. It contains some detailed coaching advice on preparing to compete in a mountain race that includes descents. There is a legitimate complaint that the Australian mountain running World Trophy team receives absolutely no financial support from its governing body, Athletics Australia. I suspect this is an experience that effects more than one mountain running organisation seeking to develop within the family of Athletics.

Alpine Grand Prix

The inaugural series in 1997 was a success in attracting the attention of many leading mountain runners. The race organisers intend to repeat the series in 1998 with the Susa(Italy) race 'Challenge Stellina'(August 23rd) joining to make it a 4 race series. The other three races will be at Lenzerheide(Swiss), July 12th; Telfes(Austria), August 16th; Bergen (Germany), September 27th. All the races are uphill only

Isabelle Guillot- Profile of a champion.

Isabelle recorded her 4th World Championship win in the 1997 World Mountain Running Trophy at Male Svatonovice on September 7th. She adds this title to those won in Die(1989), Zermatt (1991), and Gap (1993). As well as the silver medal positions she took behind her great rival Gudrun Pfluger in 1994, 95 and 96.


A disappointing performance in the European Trophy at Ebensee was put down to the horrendous weather conditions which did not suit Isabelle's slight frame. She struggled to finish in 5th position in heavy rain, wind, an unrelentingly steep and slippery course, her only real disappointment of the year.

At the age of 36, 1997 must rank as the most successful of Isabelle's running career. Three weeks after her World Mountain Trophy victory she claimed the French ladies Marathon title in a time of 2hours 37minutes 20seconds in the Reims marathon. One week before the World Trophy she was 2nd in The French ladies 10k road championships in a time of 34miutes 40seconds on a hilly course.

In preparing for the World Trophy she took to the mountains for 3 weeks, although not at altitude. During the summer she built up from 80km/week to 130km/week, this latter distance being maintained for 3 weeks. Most of her training is on mountain tracks. Her only setback occurred when she was attempting some uphill speedwork

which resulted in a strained thigh and a one week layoff.

She abandoned the speedwork idea, she does not do any track workouts, and relied on a few 12km road races on July27th and August 3rd to sharpen her performance.



She also took a full part in the French cross country season, finishing 10th in the French championships.

Other aspects of her training include mountain walks and some cycling.

Isabelle's home town of Blagnac (Toulouse) are very proud of her achievements. To encourage her athletic career she has been given leave of absence, on full pay, from her job as a teacher. This is the 6th year she has enjoyed this privilege. How successful athletes in other countries might envy such enlightened treatment!!!

She advises younger athletes at her club about training schedules, but she does not use a coach for herself.

Mountain running will remain a top priority for Isabelle

in 1998 as she leads the enormously successful French ladies in their bid for further honours on their own ground on L'ile de la Reunion.

Marco Di Gasperi - Profile of a Champion.

Becoming World mountain running champion at the age of 20 years was a remarkable feat. How did he do it?

It was obvious to all that finishing in 7th position in the 1995 junior World Trophy in Edinburgh, then winning the Junior

world title in 1996, Marco had potential. But how often we see junior talent fade away once they reach the senior ranks and other interests take priority.

Nevertheless, to convert junior promise into medal results against the strong men of mountain running is a fine achievement, not just for him but also for his coach, Giulio Cola.

His performances for his local club, Alta Societa Atletica della Valtellina


(Remember Valtellina, the site of the second World Cup in 1986) in domestic races has also been impressive. He was 4th in the 1994 Italian championship series, in 1995 he finished 3rd in the Italian junior championship. 1996 saw the start of his winning streak. He won all three races to take the Italian junior title. He also proved his ability over cross country courses, winning some races, and gaining 3rd in the cross country society Italian championship. In 1997 he was 3rd in the Italian championship series.

He has a track time for the 5000m of 15minutes 14 seconds.

On a personal level, Marco is a favourite with the girls, but I am informed that he is not engaged! At present he is in the Army and he has

trained technician. Alpine skiing is his favourite pastime. does What the hold future for Marco? Where do after you 90 the winning World championship the age of 20? Perhaps he will be content continue as of member the Italian powerful mens squad, but areas other of athletic endurance events may prove attractive. Would Marco's talent

transfer to the track, road, or cross country. Remember his countryman, Gelindo Bordin, who started his with mountain athletic career running and then won the Olympic marathon title in Seoul 1988. We will follow Marco's future career with great interest. The immediate challenges are to see if he can repeat performance his up/down Sestriere, then convert his form for the long uphill only race that awaits him in Reunion in September.

1997 European Trophy, Ebensee, (Austria) July 4th.



The most remarkable aspect of this years 'uphill only' European Trophy races was that they took place at all. The day before the race saw the commencement of the deluge that was to engulf the central European region for weeks and cause massive flooding.

After an intensive and persistent downpour on Saturday, the race day dawned with no sign of a let up in the rain and with rivers in full spate. Urgent messages from the mountain summit indicated that high winds were adding to the hazardous conditions. Faced with this dilemma the organisers recommended a shortening of all courses to eliminate about 2km of running on the mountain summit plateau. This meant that all courses climbed directly to the finish and the haven of a hotel well endowed with facilities for recovery and protection.

Each of the races was completed without serious incident, with good safety measures in place, and with good course preparation and marshalling, and rapid results service. All of which was truly a credit to the professionalism of the organising team led by Herbert Brindl (seated far right above)

As for the races, Helmut Schmuck (Austria), surprised everyone but the Austrians in beating World champion Antonio Molinary into second place. An unrelenting uphill course is still the type on which Schmuck is very difficult to beat, but introduce level running or downhill sections and he is suddenly vulnerable. Although Austria had 3rd position with

Peter Schatz, they could not prevent Italy taking the team title by just 1 point. Marco de Gasperi gave notice of his arrival into the senior ranks with a strong run into 6th position.

The shorter ladies race saw world leaders Gudrun Pfluger (5th) and Isabelle Guillot (9th) relegated to the minor places. Carol Greenwood, who won the world Trophy race way back in 1986 as Carol Haigh, now married with a little girl to keep her busy, showed that the intervening years had done little to damage her form. Always a strong runner, Carol revelled in the harsh conditions to produce a great tussle with eventual winner Eroi Spiess-Staudenmann (Switzerland). This is a girl who showed she has the ability to lead the Swiss girls to greater things if only they 'get their act together'!!

The event ,as always, was accompanied by a keenly fought open race, and afterward by a great party enjoyed by athletes and officials together.

RUNNING PURELY FOR LOVE OF MOUNTAINS.

Feature article by Kan Yaw Chong which appeared in the national newspaper of East Malaysia, the Daily Express.

The World mountain Running Trophy is an extraordinary athletic event.

The event carries no prize money. Competitors do it mainly out of love for the sport and love of mountains.

The good news is that Malaysia has won a bid to host it at

Mt. Kinabalu in 1999.

Each year runners representing up to 30 countries are taken to one of the great mountain areas of the world.

A noble aim behind the competition is to encourage people to go visit interesting mountains on Earth because it is good for them.

The impact is invariably enriching to the human spirit.

Their size, height, and beauty ignite challenge, provoke thought, and lift the spirit onto a higher plane.

That Mt. Kinabalu has been picked is a tacit recognition that it is one of the world

'greats' which we can be proud of.

By 'great', it doesn't mean the highest, but always it involves a beautiful, marvellous, unique, inspiring and even extraordinary setting so that even the worst losers feel the trip and effort justified.

In 1995, it was Arthur's seat in Edinburgh, Scotland, a dramatic 230 million year old extinct volcano.

In 1996 it was the breathtaking Austrian Tyrol in the Stubie valley from Telfes.

This year it was staged in the shadow of the Krkonose which Czechs call 'the Giant Mountains', about 2 hours drive from Prague, one of Europe's most beautiful cities.

Here all races started and finished in a small village town of less than 5,000 named Male Svatonovice. Close by were the amazing Adrspach Rocks, known locally as a sandstone rock town. Geologically it must have started as a colossal sandstone site, but the cutting action of water over millions of years had produced street like leeways through a maze of about 1000 bizarre formations and sheer towers up to 100m high.

Happily this striking natural sandstone 'town' in the foothills of the 'Giant Mountains' was made a national reservation in 1933 and irrespective of the Nazi occupation and post war communist rule, it conservation status prevailed.

Similarly, in 1999 it will be Malaysia's turn to show them giant mountain. Mt. Kinabalu, when the 15th World Mountain Running Trope races will be held in Kinabalu park.

It's really a colourful event which opens and closes with fanfare.

I the Czech Republic event, charming dancers from local arts school gave winsome performances to contemporary tunes from a full size brass band. Virtually the whole

> village turned out in the town square for what must have been an historic event for them all.

> The competition was serious, intense and fast, but the common factor is they all belong to the same fraternity of mountain lovers.

Ever since the inception of the Mt. Kinabalu

Climbathon in 1987, the organisers had wanted to attract world class runners in numbers. In 1999 all the world class men and women runners, mountain numbering some 300, plus coaches. officials. and supporters will fly here.



An impossible dream is finally coming true.!

It is a big commitment on the part of the European and American teams to give the Malaysia the host job with an overwhelming 17 votes to N.Zealand's 5, because it is a long way and potentially costly for them to come all this way. But everyone now wants to see Mt. Kinabalu.

So, it's going to be a huge promotion opportunity for the nation and the state.

The Sabah tourism Promotion Corporation staged the bid on behalf of the Malaysian Athletic Federation.

Consider this, Malaysia is the first Asian country to join the World mountain races and in 1999 will became the first non European country to stage the event.

The irresistibility of Mt. Kinabalu aside, it has to be said that after two previous bid attempts, there was a lot of goodwill towards Malaysia in its third bid at the 1997 ICMR congress in Upice on September 6th.

ICMR president, Danny Hughes, attributed a large part of Malaysia's successful bid to a 'very aggressive' campaign mounted by Balwant Singh Kler to garner support.

At the team managers meeting the night before the congress he went around to talk to every official of the voting countries to persuade support.

'Winning the bid felt like floating on air, but now it has become a heavy responsibility' said Balwant.

One promise he made in his bid presentation was to bring in other Asian countries, Japan, China, Hong Kong, Singapore, Korea and others to compete in the World trophy.




1998 European Trophy 5th July.

Preview.

The course details can be seen on the profiles drawn below. Having hand drawn it on my computer, some of the fine detail is missing. For instance, there is a nasty little bump to climb over just before the finish! The total climb/descent for the ladies is 420m consisting of one small lap and one large lap. The total climb/descent for the men is 710m, consisting of one small lap and two large laps. With the race starting at an altitude of over 2000m, these will

be tough mountain running challenges for all competitors. My personal recommendation for footwear would be studded shoes that have a good grip. Much of the course is on grassy paths, so footwear will be very important if conditions are wet.

The course is set on a ski piste area and the whole route can be seen from the start area, so spectators should come armed with binoculars.

The World's toughest Mountain Race!!

The record time, of 2 hours 42 minutes 33 seconds, was set by Kusang Gurung of Nepal in 1991. The winner for the past 3 years has been a local Malaysian, Guianus Salagan

1997 saw the organisers determined to widen the area of competition by inviting some of the leading European runner to compete. Top of the list was current European champion Helmut Schmuck, with some other Austrian colleagues including Rudolf Reitburger. Various other 'world trophy' competitors arrived such as Lyndon Ellefson of USA, Francis Cosgrove of Ireland, and a British trio, Ian Holmes, Mark Roberts (the joint British 1997 mountain running champions) and Mark Rigby. There was also a useful looking squad from Italy, although not their top runners. The familiar Louise Fairfax from Australia entered the ladies race, together with Angela Mudge from Scotland (4th in the European Trophy). 199 men set out to tackle the arduous climb of 2205m to the summit of Mt. Kinabalu (4095m), 8.72km away. It wasn't long before the powerful uphill running of Schmuck took him into the lead which he maintained all the way to the summit to earn him a bonus of \$500 US. However his 3 minute lead never looked like being enough to hold off the downhill running experts from Malaysia and Britain. Sure enough, The British champion Ian Holmes had caught him shortly after the descent started, and after this Ian gradually increased his lead to run home an easy winner. The feared challenge from Malaysian champion Salagan did not materialise as the local boy struggled with cramp in the latter stages of the race. The other two British runners showed their descending credentials as they too swept past the opposition to take 2nd and third

places. Salagan limped in 4th position having been pushed out of third place in the last 400m and gallant Helmut Schmuck, who was heard to comment to the fast descending British 'You are Mad!!', held on to finish 10th.

There was much amazement amongst the locals that the British contingent had produced a clean sweep, but if they had known the nature of the British mountain running calendar which now has 400 tough up/down races each year to choose from, they would have understood that Mt.Kinabalu held no terrors for them. Nevertheless, it has to be said that this is not a race for the fainthearted and well merits a claim to being one of the world's toughest mountain races.

The ladies race (shorter than the mens, going only to a height of 3353m) was remarkable for the fact that it was won by a little, 1.37m (4feet 6inches) local girl who does no running but works in the mountains planting rice. The more experienced World Trophy ladies had to settle for the minor positions, but Louise earned the \$500 US for reaching the high point first.

With the 1999 World Trophy taking place in Mt.Kinabalu park, and with the course now being prepared, there is likely to be even more international interest in competing in the 1998 Mt.Kinabalu race and at the same time reconnoitring the 1999 Trophy course. 



WORLDWIDE Recognition for International Mountain Races

Criteria for Associate Membership.

- 1. The race must have been staged at least twice
- 2. There must have been at least 4 countries represented in recent years.
- 3. Dope testing procedures, in accordance with IAAF rules, may be requested by the national Athletic Federation.
- 4. The race is registered and sanctioned by the national Athletic Federation
- 5. ICMR must be supplied with prior notice of the race and with a full result list.
- If required by ICMR, one of their technical officials may attend to view the race and report on the
 conduct of the event. All costs incurred by this must be met by the race organisation and the official
 will be chosen so as to minimise travel costs.
